Quarterly Report October 1st - December 31st, 2020

ABOUT PROJECT AWARE

The Project AWARE grant, provided through Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), aims to increase awareness of behavioral and mental health issues among school-aged youth by building staff capacity, engaging youth and families, and increasing access to mental health services for youth. This report summarizes a sample of accomplishments in Quarter 2 (October 1st - December 31st) of Year 2.


TRAININGS

In Quarter 2, there was a total of two Youth Mental Health First Aid trainings. A total of 300 individuals were trained including teachers, special education teachers, assistant principals, and principals.

PARTNERSHIPS

A total of 2 new MOU's (i.e., Memorandum of Understanding to provide mental health and other services to youth and families) were developed in Ouarter 2 of Year 2. The two MOUs are for the delivery of school-based mental health services. Currently, there are 20 partnerships, including those with non-profits, training, consulting, and mental health agencies. Partnerships span Chippewa and Eau Claire counties to serve a broad reach of students and families.

Type of Partnerships (Years 1 & 2)




MENTAL HEALTH REFERRALS

A total of 62 individuals were referred for mental health services in Quarter 2 of Year 2. Of those students, 35% have received services thus far, with 63% of those who have not yet received services currently working with school counselors and the mental health navigator to receive services in the future.


Of those referrals, 92% were to school-based services and 8% to community-based services.

Referrals by Type (students may be counted twice)



- School Based Mental Health
- Community Based Mental Health

Referrals & Services Received



35% of students have received services thus far. Of the 40 students who did not yet receive services:

- 15 families declined SBMH services
- I student started services in January or later (counted as not receiving services)
- 24 families are in the process of potentially setting up services
